First Supplement to Memorandum 70-16

Subject: Study 36.202 - Condemnation (The Declared Public Uses--Condemnation by Special Districts)

In Memorandum 70-16, relating to the right to take of special districts, the staff stated that it appeared that the repeal of Code of Civil Procedure Section 1238 would require changes in the statutes of only two special districts. See page 7 (Public Cemetery Districts); page 8 (Resort Improvement Districts). For your convenience, we have attached to this memorandum drafts of the suggested changes in a form suitable for inclusion in a recommendation on this subject. See attached yellow sheets (proposed Health and Safety Code Section 8961; proposed Public Resources Code Section 13070.1).

We have also attached a copy of a relatively recent newspaper article concerning California special districts that we thought might be of interest to you. The attached table summarizes the functions of the various types of special districts.

HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE § 8961 Staff recommendation

#### PUBLIC CEMETERY DISTRICTS

### § 8961. Power to acquire property by condemnation or otherwise

Sec. . Section 8961 of the Health and Safety Code is amended to read:

8961. The district may maintain a cemetery or cemeteries, limited in use to burial in the ground of residents of the district or of members of the family of a resident who has heretofore purchased a burial plot, and for this purpose may take and hold title to property by grant, gift, devise, condemnation, lease, or any other method.

Comment. Section 8961 is amended to make clear the right of public cemetery districts to acquire and hold title to realty for cemetery purposes. See Health & Saf. Code § 8961, annot. citing 14 Ops. Cal. Atty. Gen. 252. The term "condemnation" preserves the grant of condemnation authority formerly contained in subdivision (14) of Section 1238 of the Code of Civil Procedure (condemnation authorized for "cemeteries for the burial of the dead, and enlarging and adding to the same and the grounds thereof").

#### RESORT IMPROVEMENT DISTRICTS

# § 13070.1. Definition of "acquire"

- Sec. . Section 13070.1 is added to the Public Resources Code, to read:
- 13070.1. As used in this chapter, "acquire" includes but is not restricted to taking by condemnation, purchase, or lease, and receiving by donation or dedication.

<u>Comment.</u> Section 13070.1 is added to give the term "acquire" used in Section 13070 its broadest possible meaning and to insure that the repeal of Code of Civil Procedure Section 1238 will not affect adversely the districts formed under the Resort Improvement District Law.

#### PUBLIC RESOURCES CODE

#### CMAPTER'S. POWERS

#### \$ 13070. Powers; purposes

The district may \* \* \* acquire, construct, maintain and operate property, works and facilities for any one or more of the \* \* following purposes:

- (a) To supply the lubabitants of the district with water for domestic use, irrigation, sanitation, industrial use, fire protection, and recreation.
- (b) The collection, treatment or disposal of sewage, waste and storm water of the district and its lahabitants.
  - (c) Protection against fire.
- (d) Comprehensive planning for the physical growth of the area within the
- (e) The collection or disposal of garbage or refuse matter.
- (f) Public recreation by means of parks, including but not limited to aquatic parks and recreational harbors, playgrounds, golf courses, swimming pools or recreation buildings for all-year recreation, including, but not limited to facilities for public and private meetings, and other public squares and places.
  - (g) Street lighting.
  - (h) Mosquito abatement.
- (i) The equipment and maintenance of a police department or other police protection to protect and safeguard life and property.
- (j) The opening, widening, extending, straightening, and surfacing, in whole or part of any street in such district, subject to the consent of the State Department of Public Works, with respect to state highways, and local authorities, as defined in Section 385 of the Vehicle Code, with respect to highways under their jurisdiction.
- (k) The construction and improvement of bridges, culverts, curbs, gutters, drains, and works incidental to the purposes specified in subdivision (i), subject to the consent of the State Department of Public Works, with respect to state highways, and local authorities, as defined in Section 385 of the Vehicle Code, with respect to highways under their jurisdiction.
- (I) The construction and maintenance of parking facilities, and other transportation facilities. (Added Stats.1961, c. 2060, p. 4300, § 1, as amended Stats.1968, c. 2067, p. 4317, § 9.)

The district may hold, use, enjoy, lease or dispose of any of its property. (Added by Stats 1968, c. 362, p. 662, § 3.)

# Survey Indicates State Has Hundreds and Hundreds of Special Districts; Los Angeles County Reports More Than 350 Such Governmental Divisions

SACRAMENTO - Coming close to the situation of the "old woman who lived in a shoe and had so many children she didn't know what to do," Sacramento County has so many special districts it can scarcely keep track of them all.

According to Fred Christensen. assistant executive officer of the Sacramento Locai Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO), the current total is 123 - provided all the districts have been discovered and accounted for appropriately.

This is not an easy task because district information is consolidated in one central locale. Pieces of information must be gathered from a variety of sources, including the county assessor, board of supervisors, recorder, recorder. voter registration and elections, department of public works, the state board of equalization, secretary of state, state controller, and the districts themselves.

Because of the wide diffusion of information among the various sources and the interference necessitated by the required performance of their routines, the current status of the acores of special districts is sometimes obscured and unclear.

It takes time for all the sources to catch up with the changes that are taking place continuously indeed, some may never catch up entirely because of the ponderous load of their other activities - so that apparent discrepancies between sources must be compared and ironed out in order to arrive at

One problem in comparing state and county figures seems to lie in the difficulty of uniform district classification. Classifications have varied in name and number through the years and are hard to agree upon because the functions of similar districts may vary in number and type.

How Do You Classify

in broad classifications that must apply statewide the Office of the Controller lists 22 for Sacramente County in its special district financial report for 1967-68, whereas in 1965-66 the county divided them into 24 different categories. Some corresponded with the state classifications; some did not.

Another problem lies in the counting of districts.

"Irrigation districts are not special districts; they are in a class by themselves and have a separate financial report." explained Gentry Durham, state controller special representative.

As such, the State does not include them in its tally of special districts, but the county definitely does, Christensen asserted.

For what of the irrigation district that supplies water service and the water district that takes care of inrigation - can they be separated? Which tally reflects reality?

The problem of counting takes in also the technicalities of individual district tabulation. In its category delineations the state report included and counted districts dissolved and not in operation, such as the Planehaven Maintenance District, dissolved Nov. 21, 1966.

However. also included districts not mentioned by LAFCO, such as the Linwood Water Maintenance District, begun Jan. 20, 1964, and the Valley Hi Greens Water Maintenance District, begun Oct. 23, 1967.

One unusual case within the county itself involves the Galt Irrigation District. Formed in 1953, it is still listed with LAFCO as a special district and came up on the recent County Board of Supervisors

However, within the county it was not listed with four other budget and tax levy and according to a spokesman from the Special Districts section or the County Department of Public Works, was discontinued in 1967.

Dead District Not Dead

Dorothy Miller, appointed to a four-year term as the district's assessor-collector-treasurer by the County Board of Supervisors Nov. 17. said the district is very much alive and in full cooperation with the county as a special district.

On the other hand, another district, the Elk Grove Irrigation District, listed but with zero budget and tax levy in 1965-66, has not been heard of since June 21, 1967, when it made a request that the county take over its functions, according to an office spokesman for the board of supervisors.

The district is not and has not been listed with the county clerk, and attempts have been made by the registration and elections supervisor to contact the district by letters dated May 28, with no. results as yet.

Gait Irrigation District, however, is listed and actively participates in holding its board elections - an example of a paradox in the counting of districts.

Most Prevalent Type

Special districts exist in every state and far outnumber the combined total of all other types of government. Though they had their birth in the toll roads and canal corporations of the early 1800's, according to the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations report of 1964, they are most prevalent in the younger states that successively formed the western boundaries and grew rapidly as the nation expanded.

'If school districts are excluded, California is exceeded only by Illinois in the number and total expenditures of special districts," write Stanley Scott and John C. Bollens, authors of Special Districts in California Local Government.

Among the counties, Los Angeles has headed the list for at least 20 years, having nearly 350 or more special districts. Sacramento County occupied second place until recent years when LAFCO contributed to the curtailment of district formation.

'According to state figures, San Joaquin County is in second place at 165, San Diego County a close third with 162, Sacramento County in sevents place at 126, and Contra Costa County a close eighth with 125. However, these figures can only be approximate.

Special District Definition What is a special district?

Within the provisions of the Knox-Nisbet Act, effective Sept. 20, which authorized establishment of local agency formation commissions to regulate district growth, special district is defined as "an agency of the state for the local performance of proprietary governmental or **functions** within limited boundaries" and "does not include the state, a city, a county, or a school district."

In his book California Government, Leroy C. Hardy writes, "Special districts are created to perform a special function not provided by existing governmental units."

Scott and Bollens write that a special district must have (1) a resident population in a defined area, (2) a legally authorized governmental body, (3) a separate legal identity, (4) power to provide public services, and (5) a substantial degree of autonomy and power to raise at least part of its own revenue.

In California Government and Politics, Winston Crouch and others give examples of how special districts affect the lives of Californians:

A Riverside resident takes a drink of water supplied by the Metropolitan Water District: a Sacramento householder turns on lights from electricity supplied by the municipal utility district (SMUD); a San Joaquin County farmer waters his asparagus from the assistance of the irrigation district:

An Atascadero resident in San Luis Obispo County has his rubbish picked up Ly a garbage disposal district truck; a farmer needing help in terracing his land receives assistance from a soil conservation district; a commuter on the Golden Gate Bridge is using bridge and highway district facilities;

Bus riders in Los Angeles County use facilities of the Metropolitan Rapid Transit District; a fire alarm sounding in Lafayette, Contra Costa County, is answered by a fire protection district; and examples could go on and on.

In 1966 the 4,886 special districts counted that year were about 11 times the combined number of cities and counties, writes the same author.

The latest state figures of 3,811 special districts is about 8 times the combined total of 400 cities and 57 counties.

#### Districts Fill Gap

Christian L. Larsen and others write in Growth and Government in Sacramento that "functions of the city and county governments overlap and the personal interests of the officials do not always encourage them to take a broad community-wide view."

The community sense of identity developed by many unicorporated areas led residents to seek the establishment of special districts to supply municipal services not required by county residents as a whole. Separate district tax structures became necessary.

Larsen describes the situation as "a reasonably adequate level of metropolitan services administered by a complicated and illegical system of overlapping jurisdictions."

Commenting on the state picture of special districts, Durham said the system is complex because "it happened rather than being planned." Each county is unique in its needs from the primitive conditions of sparsely populated Alpine County to the sophisticated complexity of metropolitan Los Angeles, he said.

The needs of each district are also unique, like those of each human being, he explained.

#### Origin in Swamp

The infinit beginnings of California special districts can be traced back as far as April 28, 1855-or perhaps earlier - to an act to

provide for the sale (at \$1 an acre) of swamp and overflowed lands belonging to the state.

The lands had been granted by an Act of Contress on Sept. 28, 1850, to "enable the State of Arkansas and other States to reclaim Swamp Lands within their limits."

An act of April 21, 1958, and an amendment April 18, 1859, provided for money received for the lands to be placed in a Swamp Land Fund for reclamation.

Reclamation was authorized in an act approved May 13, 1861, and another act of April 11, 1862, authorized the 5-county Board of S w a m p L a n d Commissioners created by the first act to sue swamp land monies to pay for reclamation.

The organization and government of reclamation districts was first set down in an act of March 28, 1868; irrigation districts were first organized by the Wright Act of 1887.

The oldest district in Sacramento County, Reclamation District No. 3, claims its formation date as 1861. The next oldest existing district is No. 317, organized by a special act in 1877.

The oldest irrigation district is Carmichael, formed in 1916. Fair Oaks was formed in 1917; Citrus Heights, in 1920. The earliest districts were formed mostly in Southern California without sufficient consideration of water supply, agricultural potentialities, and financial abilities, according to Crouch, and suffered setbacks.

Sacramento's three oldest irrigation districts were formed in an era when an improved agricultural market restored confidence, writes Crouch.

#### District Urganization Law

Though special districts are mentioned by name in Article 1, Section 14, of the California Constitution of 1879, no one law established and legalized the existence of the whole group until the district Organization Law of Aug. 21, 1933.

Some 175 or more pieces of legislation or enabling acts have brought into being the numerous districts and types of districts that exist today.

They and most other legislation passed since California became a state have now been codified by a

Code Commission in a process that began in 1929 and was completed in 1955.

Further legislation affecting special districts includes LAFCO formation - established in Sacramento in November, 1964 - and the District Reorganization Act of 1965.

The District Reorganization Act established a uniform procedure for reorganizing, consolidating, and dissolving almost all special districts, which would be handled through LAPCO.

Laws Bring Changes

The two laws together have done much to curb excessive growth of additional special districts and to promote reorganization for greater efficiency and less duplication of services.

At I.AFCO's creation in Sacramento County there were 149 special districts. The following year the number had decreased to 134, and the year after that, 123 - where it has remained.

Some districts have been added; others under control of the County Board of Supervisors have been consolidated and dissolved in accordance with board policy. Examples are Morrison Creek Flood Control District now part of the Sacramento County Water Agency. Barrett Hills Maintenance District now part of Carmichael Irrigation District, and Del Dayo Estates Maintenance District now part of Arcade County Water District.

Additional changes can be expected in the future, but as always, progress is slow.
