In future years, the staff will informally canvass Commission members about their availability, before preparing a proposed meeting schedule.

New Topics and Priorities

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The Commission considered Memorandum 2020-59, which discusses the Commission's scope of authority, the process of obtaining additional authority, and related matters. The memorandum was informational. No Commission action was required or taken.

The Commission also considered Memorandum 2020-60 and its First Supplement which presented the question of whether the Commission should request authority to study interstate reciprocity for higher education distance learning. The Commission will do so, using the language set out on page 2 of Memorandum 2020-60.

STUDY E-200 – RECODIFICATION OF TOXIC SUBSTANCE STATUTES

The Commission considered Memorandum 2020-62 and its first Supplement, discussing the Commission's tentative recommendation.

The Commission made the following decisions:

- The list of issues for possible future study will be expanded to include issues that were discussed in Notes in the tentative recommendation, but could not be resolved in this study (see, e.g., Exhibit, pp. 1-4). The listed issues will not be limited to those that are appropriate for future work by the Commission.
- The staff will present revised language for proposed Health and Safety Code Section 68200 that is more consistent with the Director of Finance's role in the state budget process.

• Proposed Health and Safety Code Section 68020 will not be changed. (Commissioner Rubin was not present when this decision was made.)

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- Proposed Health and Safety Code Section 68105 will be revised as presented on page 14 of Memorandum 2020-62. (Commissioner Rubin was not present when this decision was made.)
- The question of whether proposed Section Health and Safety Code 68210 should be adjusted to reflect current conditions will be included on the list of issues for possible future study. (Commissioner Rubin was not present when this decision was made.)
- With the exception of proposed Health and Safety Code Section 68200 (discussed above), the Commission approved the staff's recommendations on all of the proposed consent items. (Commissioner Rubin was not present when this decision was made.)
- The recommendation will recodify Health and Safety Code Section 25359.20 as a single section, with only minimal, necessary changes to its language. The question of whether this provision should be amended to reflect the decision in *Boeing Co. v. Movassaghi*, 768 F.3d 832 (2014), will be included on the list of issues for possible future study. (*Commissioner Rubin was not present when this decision was made.*)

STUDY J-1407 — STATUTES MADE OBSOLETE BY TRIAL COURT RESTRUCTURING (PART 8): JUDICIAL BENEFITS

The Commission considered Memorandum 2020-59, on revising some statutes relating to judicial benefits to remove material made obsolete by trial court restructuring. For purposes of a tentative recommendation, the Commission made the following decisions:

- Articles 9, 16, 20, 25, and 30 of Chapter 10 of Title 8 of the Government Code should be revised to include a sunset provision, which would repeal the article in fifty years, subject to a savings clause as shown on page 13 of Memorandum 2020-59. (Commissioner Miller-O'Brien voted against this decision; Commissioner Rubin was not present when the decision was made.) The accompanying Comment for each article should expressly state that the savings clause applies to the repeal pursuant to the sunset provision. (Commissioner Rubin was not present when the decision was made.)
- Government Code Section 77210 should be revised to include a sunset provision, which would repeal the section in fifty years, subject to a savings clause as shown on page 13 of Memorandum 2020-59. The accompanying Comment should expressly state that the savings clause applies to the repeal pursuant to the sunset

provision. (Commissioners Carrillo and Rubin were not present when the decision was made.)

- The tentative recommendation should not propose any revisions to Government Code Sections 69907 or 69909. (Commissioner Rubin was not present when this decision was made.)
- Government Code Section 69893.7 contains material relating to court reporter compensation, which is not ripe for cleanup (see Minutes (Aug. 2020), p. 3). The Commission will wait to deal with the section comprehensively when it is ready to consider the court reporter compensation issues. (Commissioner Rubin was not present when this decision was made.)

STUDY L-3032.5 — STOCK COOPERATIVES AND THE UNIFORM TOD SECURITY REGISTRATION ACT

The Commission considered Memorandum 2020-61, which discusses the development of a statute to allow for the nonprobate transfer of an owner's interest in a stock cooperative. The Commission approved all of the staff recommendations made in the memorandum.

STUDY X-100 — EMERGENCY-RELATED REFORMS

The Commission considered Memorandum 2020-64 and its First Supplement, presenting a draft recommendation on the use of teleconferencing in common interest development meetings during an emergency.

The Commission approved the draft as a final recommendation, with one change. The following provision was added to the proposed law:

Civ. Code § 4090 (amended). Board meeting

4090. "Board meeting" means either of the following:

- (a) A congregation, at the same time and place, of a sufficient number of directors to establish a quorum of the board, to hear, discuss, or deliberate upon any item of business that is within the authority of the board.
- (b) A teleconference, where a sufficient number of directors to establish a quorum of the board, in different locations, are connected by electronic means, through audio or video, or both. A teleconference meeting shall be conducted in a manner that protects the rights of members of the association and otherwise complies with the requirements of this act. Except for a meeting that will be held solely in executive session or conducted under Section 5450, the notice of the teleconference meeting shall identify at least one physical location so that members of the association may attend, and at least one director or a person designated by the
