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STUDY E-200 — RECODIFICATION OF TOXIC SUBSTANCE STATUTES

The Commission considered Memoranda 2021-6 and 2021-7, presenting draft

19 final recommendations for the recodification of Chapter 6.8 of Division 20 of the

20 Health and Safety Code and the associated conforming revisions. All of the

21 matters discussed in these memoranda were proposed consent. The Commission

- 22 approved the drafts without change as final recommendations. (Commissioner
- 23 *Jenkins was not present when these decisions were made.*)

24 The Commission also considered Memorandum 2021-8. No Commission

25 action was required or taken.

STUDY J-1407 — STATUTES MADE OBSOLETE BY TRIAL COURT RESTRUCTURING

27 (PART 8): JUDICIAL BENEFITS

The Commission considered Memorandum 2021-9 and its First Supplement,

29 which discuss whether to revise Government Code Sections 53200.3, 53214.5,

30 69894.3, and 69894.4 to remove material made obsolete by trial court

31 restructuring. The Commission made the following decisions:

• The staff should seek further input from the Superior Court of Los Angeles County regarding Section 69894.4. The Commission would like to know more about the court's position and its reasoning. It would be helpful to have a court representative attend the next Commission meeting on this subject. The staff should try to arrange this.

- To help determine the intended scope of Sections 69894.3 and 69894.4 (i.e., whether those sections were intended to apply solely to Los Angeles County, or also to other counties with populations over 2,000,000), the staff should contact State Archives and request legislative history materials relating to those sections.
- The parts of Section 69894.3 that relate to benefits of judges and jurors do not appear to be obsolete due to trial court restructuring.

The Commission started to discuss the parts of Section 69894.3 that relate to court employees and transfer rights, but it did not make any decisions about how to handle those parts for purposes of a tentative recommendation. Due to time constraints, the Commission did not discuss Section 53200.3 or Section 53214.5.

The Commissioners had many questions about the issues raised in Memorandum 2021-9 and its First Supplement. The staff should make further efforts to obtain stakeholder input on those issues.

STUDY L-3032.5 — STOCK COOPERATIVES AND THE UNIFORM TOD SECURITY REGISTRATION ACT

The Commission considered Memorandum 2021-5, which discusses the development of a statute to allow for the nonprobate transfer of an owner's interest in a stock cooperative. The Commission made the following decisions:

- The proposed law will include contest provisions similar to Probate Code Sections 5690-5696.
- The proposed law will take the same approach to conflicting instruments that is taken in Probate Code Section 5660.
- The proposed law will require that a transfer on death registration of an interest in a stock cooperative be recorded.
- The proposed law will take the same approach to joint tenancy and community property with a right of survivorship that is taken in Probate Code Section 5664.
- The proposed law will include provisions on spousal consent to a transfer of community property, similar to Probate Code Sections 5666 and 5668.
