Miscellaneous Hearsay Exceptions: Present Sense Impressions

Request for Public Comment

A present sense impression is a statement that describes an event or condition that the speaker is perceiving, or has just perceived. For example, a bystander might say, "Look, there's a masked man running out of the bank carrying a black briefcase!"

Under the hearsay rule, such a statement is inadmissible in court unless it falls within an exception to the rule. In this tentative recommendation, the Law Revision Commission proposes that California enact a hearsay exception for a present sense impression.

The Federal Rules of Evidence and a vast majority of states have such an exception. The Evidence Code currently includes an exception for a contemporaneous statement, but not for a present sense impression. After weighing the justifications for such an exception against criticism of various aspects of the exception, the Commission tentatively recommends legislation to adopt a hearsay exception for a present sense impression.

The Commission solicits comment on the proposal.

The Commission expects to approve a final recommendation on February 14, 2008. Comments must be received by then to have any impact on the Commission's recommendation.
