## MEMORANDUM 2025-40

## Terminology Relating to Persons with Disabilities (Status Report)

In 2024, the Commission<sup>1</sup> was directed by the Legislature<sup>2</sup> to study and recommend consistent and comprehensive nonsubstantive replacement of the terms "dependent adult" and "dependent person" throughout California codes, with new terms describing the defined persons, which include people with disabilities, "in a respectful way."<sup>3</sup>

As part of the assigned study, the Commission was also directed to convene and obtain input from a working group composed of representatives from the state protection and advocacy agency<sup>4</sup> and the California Department of Social Services, as well as persons and groups representing persons described by the current definitions of "dependent adults" and "dependent persons."<sup>5</sup>

## SECOND WORKING GROUP MEETING

The staff convened a second working group meeting on August 22, 2025. The goal for the meeting was to continue to work toward a majority recommendation on replacement terms the working group believes would best comply with the legislative directive, which would then be submitted to the Commission for its consideration.

The second meeting continued a spirited and helpful discussion, with arguments made in support of and against suggested replacement terms.<sup>7</sup> No consensus on appropriate replacement terms was achieved, but there appeared to be a narrowing of possible choices.

## **NEXT STEPS**

The staff believes a third and final meeting should result in substitute terms supported by a clear majority of the working group, which will then be presented to the Commission for its consideration at the December meeting.

In addition, following the Commission's decision on appropriate replacement terms for those terms defined in current law, a second issue the Commission will then have to decide is how or whether to address the terms "dependent adult" and dependent person" in the codes that are not linked to any statutory definition.<sup>8</sup>

Based on the constraint in AB 1906 that the Commission's final recommendation in this study not substantively change existing law, that second decision, when the time comes, could be as important as the recommendation the Commission ultimately makes
